My dear Parishioners and Friends,

Mount Carmel has been famed from Old Testament times for its beauty. It is one of the most attractive places in the Holy Land. The Carmel range stretches for a distance of about fifteen miles, majestically overlooking the sea at its northwestern extremity.

It was here that the prophet Elijah defended the faith of the people of Israel in the living God. In 1156 a group of hermits settled there and later set up the Carmelite Order to lead a contemplative life under the patronage of the Mother of God.

We are the only diocese in England dedicated to Our Lady of Mount Carmel. The

dedication goes right back to the start of our diocese when the hierarchy was restored in 1850. The first bishop of Salford, **William Turner**, petitioned the Holy See to place the diocese under the patronage of **Our Lady of Mount Carmel**. The petition was granted, and Our Lady of Mount Carmel was established as principal patron of our diocese.

We will keep her feast day **next Friday, 16 July**.

Thank you to all who contacted our local MP to tell him your concerns about the amendment to the Police Bill which was to have been debated in Parliament last Monday. The amendment if passed would have allowed abortions in England for any reason whatever right up to the birth of the child.

In the event, no vote was needed as Diane Johnson MP withdrew her proposed amendment. So too did Rupa Huq MP, whose proposed amendment would have introduced a jail sentence of up to two years for offering support to women outside abortion clinics nationwide.

It appears that the abortion lobby realised that it was very likely that both amendments were going to be defeated and so they encouraged the MPs not to take these amendments to a vote.

Thousands of people rallied last weekend to get friends and family to email their MPs. MPs received more emails ahead of this vote than they have ever received ahead of an abortion vote, and in some cases, MPs received more emails on this issue than they had received on any other issue while in office. Well done! You have struck a blow for a more civilized country.

The European Parliament on the other hand seems to be going worse. They voted last week, by 378 votes against 255 with 42 abstentions, to adopt a report which defined abortion as a fundamental human right. The report also called conscientious objection to abortion a 'denial of medical care'.
