Snakes and Ladders

The story of the People of God is full of ups and downs: Second Chronicles records the burning down of the Temple and the descent of the people into infidelity and depravity:—a downward spiral that leads them from the Holy City to exile by the rivers of Babylon. It was there that the chosen people were at their lowest—where they sat down and wept.

And the Serpent that Moses holds up in the wilderness was a low-down, slippery thing: spreading poison and death. Lifted up, by the prophet, it becomes a sign of the Cross: the lowest point in the history of humanity, through which God raised a fallen world. Over this whole, sorry story of snakes and ladders, Jesus, the risen Christ now presides.

Over the last few weeks, we've considered the *arma Christi*, the weapons of salvation and today our readings inspire us to think of two more instruments of the Passion: the ladders and the dice.

Like the people of Israel, we sometimes refuse to believe that there's any providence in what happens to us. Why this now? Why me? As if life were a cruel game and everything subject to chance. And then we remember the die cast at the foot of the Cross—the lottery for Christ's clothing—and we think again. In the story of the Passion, we see how the love and mercy of God turns everything to the good: even the most desperate things. By his grace, God weaves all that seems random and wrong in our lives into a work of art—the good life we were meant to live from the beginning.

Proverbs 16:33 says: "We may throw the dice but the Lord determines how they fall." Through the obedience of Jesus, God turns the desperate, downward spiral of human history around and "raises us up with him and gives us a place with him in heaven."

God raises us on the ladder of the Cross—when according to the light of Christ's death and resurrection, we start to understand the mystery of our own lives: That through the action of God's grace all that has brought us down and made us low becomes the means of our being raised in Christ: sickness, sin and suffering become the ladder by which we reach new life.

To see the work of art that God makes from the change and chance of life we need the light of faith—to believe. We need to live in Christ and accept that through the ladder of the Cross we can climb to new life. Jesus tells Nicodemus that he must be born again, leave go of old patterns and step out into the light of faith. God's grace helps us to do this in Lent. It helps us to see in the ups and downs of life—an artful pattern whereby God is bringing us closer to himself and making us more like him. In Lent, grace gives us courage to mount the ladder of the Cross and to make our way to God.
