

Quarant'ore—Forty Hours Devotion

This year, the Feast of Corpus Christi falls on Sunday 2nd June. I thought it would be good to mark the Solemn Feast with the traditional devotion of forty hours of continuous prayer before the Blessed Sacrament. This ancient practice was begun by St Philip Neri. It represents a time of special waiting: like Christ's time in the tomb, like the forty days of Lent and the forty days in which we wait for the Holy Spirit. These are Forty Hours in which we wait with Christ in the Blessed Sacrament and praise him for all that we have received through him in these days: life and love, the Spirit.

We will need to ensure that, day and night, the exposed Sacrament is never alone and that an atmosphere of prayer and silence is maintained in the church through out the Exposition. There are some sign-up sheets on the notice board in the church porch. Please sign up for a slot or two and come to pray before the Blessed Sacrament in which the Lord Jesus remains to welcome you at all times: Pray for all you need, especially for peace in our world and give thanks for all you have. Candles will be available.

Chosen, Justified, Glorified

Today's readings are about God's choice and our election to life in Christ, through the Spirit. We have the story of the replacement of Judas from *The Acts of the Apostles* and in the Gospel, Jesus speaks of how he keeps together, as one, those God has chosen, by consecrating them in the Spirit. There is an obvious tension between the specific election of the chosen in Christ and God's desire that all people be saved. Last week, St. Peter told us that he'd come to realise that God does not have favourites - While, this week, we hear of those specially chosen and consecrated in the Spirit to new life in Christ. How, in God's providence and love, can this be?

I remember an argument between my Grandma and her daughter, my auntie Rita: Well, not so much an argument as a fruitful discussion: You didn't argue with Rita! The discussion was around the fact that each time my Grandma was blessed with a new grandchild, she bought him or her a $\pounds 1$ Premium Bond to celebrate their Baptism. And then, each year, on their birthday, she bought them another. By the way, the one she bought me for my Baptism came up on my ordination day and I won $\pounds 500$ —but that's another story!

In old age, Grandma said to Rita that she'd come to realise that this was wrong and that she was worried: The older ones were going to end up with more and she was supposed to love all her grandchildren equally; to love them all the same. Auntie Rita's sage response was: "No, mother, you're not right. You can't love them all the same because they're all different!"

That's the same tension that our Scripture readings present to us, isn't it? Like Peter, through life, we come to realise that God does not have favourites - and yet, equally, we hopefully learn that we're each favoured: specially chosen in Christ and consecrated through his Spirit. No one is a favourite and we are all favourites.

Why is this? On the one hand, there are no favourites because we are all equal before God - on the other hand, we are all favourites because each of us is different, yet the same. Together, we are called, justified and glorified by God's grace: consecrated by the Holy Spirit to a common life in Christ with our brothers and sisters. God doesn't love us all the same: because we're all different. God loves us individually but as One, as if we were each the only One, a favourite: God's firstborn.

There's a wonderful Preface in the Missal that speaks of this - that God sees and loves in us what he sees and loves in his own Son. By grace, when God looks at us, He sees Jesus, His only Son. In Christ, we are made one. Through the grace of the Holy Spirit and out of our unique and wonderful variety, we are made the Body of Christ: No favourites - all the Favourite.
