Repent and Turn

My dad had a party trick: something he had practiced for years and that he could do perfectly. At family gatherings he'd always end up with a group of young people round him, trying to copy him. He made what he did look simple and then he'd challenge those watching to do the same. His dad had taught him this when he was a boy and he made it look so easy. First he'd stand up straight with his feet together. Then he'd put an old penny behind his left heel and keeping his two feet in place, he'd turn his whole body until he could stoop and pick up the coin, behind him, with his right hand. He'd never even wobble or fall over. Only as an adult did he discover why his dad kept doing these things! He'd had a bayonet wound in his stomach in the First World War and these exercises were like primitive physio, to strengthen the muscles in his stomach and prevent hard, inflexible scars.

I thought of my dad with a gathering of fit young men around him, laughing, and failing at his challenge. I thought about that, when I read about Jesus in the Gospel, amidst his disciples, showing them his hands and feet and challenging them to turn and to live and move like him.

Most of the people mentioned in our readings today have been scarred. Abraham and Isaac, scarred by the offering God expected on Mount Moriah. Jacob, wounded by wrestling with the angel. Peter, by his triple denial, Thomas by his doubts. We're told that all of the disciples are agitated and troubled - and wouldn't they be scarred by the events of Good Friday? And then, peacefully, Jesus comes among them and with a new agility, shows them his hands and feet: - the wounds of his glorious, new body. Interesting, that the resurrection healed those wounds but didn't take them away.

We're all of us scarred by life to some extent aren't we? Things have happened that have hurt us. We carry the marks - but the secret of new life is to bend and turn: not to let these things - these things that we have done and that have happened to us - make us hard and inflexible. We have to be forgiving, to repent and turn and embrace the free movement of the resurrection.

I suppose my grandad could have been bitter about what he suffered in the war - about his wounds. He could have been justifiably resentful, and not moved on. Instead he taught his little boy a trick - a trick that stopped those wounds becoming hard and inflexible - a trick of forgiveness and love that gathered others around him and brought life and happiness in generation after generation. Isn't this what Jesus shows us of his resurrection life? Luke teaches us that He enters that Upper Room with no bitterness about what had happened to him on Good Friday; no resentment about what he'd suffered. "Peace be with you," he says, as he shows them his wounds.
