Fire to the Earth

The centrepiece in the chapel of the English College, Rome, is a sixteenth-century painting by Durante Alberti. It hangs on the wall above the altar. God, the Father and the Holy Spirit present the body of the crucified Son. Blood flows down from Christ's body onto a globe – igniting it into a fiery blaze. The painting offers a visual depiction of the words of Jesus in today's Gospel: words which form the college motto: "I am come to cast fire on the earth." The blood of Jesus is testament to the fire of God's love. It gives witness to the depth of God's love for the world.

In the time of Elizabeth I, when the Catholic faith was outlawed in our lands, men trained in this college so that they could return to their homeland and minister to believers there in secret. Many were arrested and killed for the faith they showed. And so, their blood also became a testament to the fire of God's love – gave witness to the depth of His love for the world. When news reached Rome of the murder of a priest on mission, the students would gather beneath this painting and sing God's praises. Forty-four young priests were martyred for the faith – they came back to ignite the fire and it spread quickly in the hearts of the people.

So, if we find the question of Jesus in the Gospel—"Do you think I have come to bring peace to the earth?" - strange and unpalatable – perhaps we should think again of the men and women of the Elizabethan age. How deep did their love of God go if they were willing to be separated from their families for it? Households were divided – quite literally—father against son, mother against daughter.

And when we think about our own lives, we might relate to the struggles Jesus speaks about in this passage. Many of us have friends or family members who do not share our faith. These situations often lead to uncomfortable conversations and heartaches as differing views on life and faith create shadows on loving relationships. We may feel alone or misunderstood, struggling to maintain our convictions while yearning for familial acceptance. Jesus, throughout His ministry, often faced opposition from His own people, including family. Even though Luke 12:53 might be a sobering truth about familial tension, it also offers solace. We join in a tradition of believers who have faced the same challenges. Many who have walked the faith journey before us have dealt with similar situations and can stand alongside us. Our commitment allows us to show love, patience, and kindness to those with whom we might disagree.

God's love has not changed. The blood of Jesus is still offered in sacrifice for the world—it still brings fire to our lives so that we too might join the great cloud of witnesses and give testimony to God's love.
