# Day of Recollection for Readers and Eucharistic Ministers

On Saturday,16th March I'm hoping to have a few hours recollection for our parish Ministers and Readers. If we met for Mass at 11am, we could then go over to the Hall for two short talks and a buffet lunch together. I expect the recollection being complete by 3pm at the latest. It would great if as many of us as possible could meet together.

The Mass of the Lord's Supper on Maundy Thursday provides a perfect opportunity for the commissioning and recommissioning of ministers. I understand that some may be away for Easter but it would be good if as many as possible could attend the commissioning.

# Straight as an Arrow

One of my favourite images for Jesus is an arrow: the strong, swift arrow that takes our humanity straight to the Father's heart. It's a great image for Lent: The association between the arrow and the bow mentioned twice in our first reading— and the fact that Ash Wednesday got caught up with all the Valentine images of red hearts and golden arrows—made me think of it. God, in Christ, is always reaching out to be reconciled with us.

But the real reason to think of Jesus the Arrow, today, and all through Lent, is because it helps with our understanding of sin. From the start, this season confronts us with a strong sense of iniquity: our own sins and the sins of all the world. In truth and with the psalmist, we say in Lent: "my offences, truly, I know them; my sin is always before me." It's not just our sins that are before us—not just a moment of truth but a moment of decision too. At the beginning of Lent we also hear: "See, today, I set before you life and prosperity, death and disaster—choose life then!"

How many times have we faced the moment of truth about ourselves and the moment of decision to change? And how many times have we accepted neither?! That this is the 57th Lent of my life makes me shudder—and if I didn't think often of the Arrow, it'd either make me feel either completely frustrated or make me want to hang my head in shame.

But, you see, the Scriptures describe sin as "missing the mark" - all those things we've done and not done that fall short or go astray, like arrows that miss. Things that don't reach their goal or fail to come to completion: all that is inadequate, frustrated, incomplete in our life and in our world.

This is not how we were in the beginning. This is not how God made us. We were on target then—humanity was heading to heaven. So there's something terribly sad about sin—that it has frustrated who we are and spoiled the good work of God: Making us frustrated; a people who can no longer reach the goal for which God made us.

Yet, Jesus, the Son of God, reached the heart of the Father in his and in our humanity. Straight as an arrow he went. Tempted but unswerving, he took us with him and through his death and resurrection, set us free.

This is maybe why Julian of Norwich rightly said "our sin shall be our glory." Because of the happy fault of sin, we have been baptised into Christ Jesus—attached ourselves to Jesus, the Arrow, so that all that is off target, frustrated and incomplete in us, can be brought to completion and perfection: hits a bulls eye—the happiness of heaven in Christ.
