#### A Dear Ransom

There is an unfathomable saying in the second letter that Paul wrote to the Corinthians. It goes like this: "God made the sinless one into sin for us so that in him we might become the righteousness of God." God became the unrighteous one so that we might be righteous in God's sight. Staggering as it is, maybe that saying allows us to understand a bit better today's difficult Gospel. Perhaps it allows us to grasp the identity of the steward of the unrighteous - and to dare to say that Jesus is this dishonest manager.

You see, our Gospel today is part of a longer passage. It should actually begin, "And Jesus also said to his disciples ..." So if this is what he "also said" what had he said just before? Well, the story of the lost sheep and the parable of the prodigal son in fact. And the reason Jesus said what he did was because the Pharisees were criticising our Saviour for associating closely with prostitutes and sinners. After speaking about a lost sheep he told a story of a son who goes to a far country and when he and his women had squandered the inheritance, then that son returns to the father's house in penance and is restored to his rightful place. Was the far country our world, and after emptying himself here of all his inheritance did Jesus not return to the Father's house in heaven? Does the father in that story not have shades of our merciful Heavenly Father and is Jesus not his Prodigal Son?

And if Jesus had already said all this does that story not shed light on the parable we have listened to today - the one that speaks of a mysteriously praiseworthy unjust steward; the one we find it so difficult to understand? Might not Jesus himself be the unjust steward, the steward of the unrighteous as our Gospel calls him?

Jesus emptied himself of his equality with God, he ceased to be manager of all that's made and by his death—his losing office - he cancelled out the debts of his brothers and sisters: here take your bond and write thirty!

The ransom paid to make us righteous—the ransom of Jesus—is a mystery that the biblical writers struggle to describe. It's a mystery we will never fully understand. What was the ransom and to whom was it paid—and why did it have to be paid? St Paul also gives us this testimony today: "There is one God, and there is one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus, who gave himself as a ransom for all."

From this we know our ransom—Jesus, God himself! A ransom not paid to the Devil—but given within the life of God to the Father, in our nature and on our behalf. Not a just or legal demand but a free act of love between Father and Son—something so incredible as to seem madness to the calculating human minds. As crazy as the acts of an unjust steward.
