The Mass of the Lord's Supper on Maundy Thursday provides a perfect opportunity for the commissioning and recommissioning of ministers. I understand that some may be away for Easter but it would be good if as many as possible could attend the commissioning.

Arma Christi

Lent began with a declaration of war: A spiritual battle against the dark powers that control us, rob us of our freedom, and make life unmanageable. In this struggle, St Paul gives us great encouragement by reminding us that God is on our side. But what does this mean in reality?

Last week, I mentioned Christ, the arrow, who takes our humanity straight to the Father's heart. Just as I finished preaching and turned round, I noticed the angel behind me carrying the long arrow—the lance that pierced the Saviour's side and went up into his Sacred Heart, as he hung on the Cross. And then I noticed that this was one of four angels hovering round the Cross that is always before us here; angels that carry in their hands what are called the *arma Christi*—the weapons of Christ. Maybe these angels have a message for us this Lent—some wisdom they'd like to share with us about the spiritual battle we're engaged in? About what it means to have God on our side and the weapons of Christ at our disposal.

If you take a closer look, you'll notice that one angel carries the image of Christ's face left on Veronica's veil:—So that, like the disciples in today's Gospel, we come face to face with our humanity, as through the instruments of the Passion and the ministration of the angels, it's transfigured into the image of God. Let's consider then, for a few moments, how these terrible weapons have changed transfigured us.

Whose weapons are they anyway? Well, they're certainly not just the weapons of Jews—or Romans or leaders: they're the weapons of humanity itself, instruments of evil that still mark our world and that we all use to wage war on each other and on creation. But Jesus, who is on our side, has taken up these weapons of ours. For us and for our salvation he has allowed them to be used against him, so that the humanity he shares with us might be transfigured into the image of God. They have become the weapons of Christ—the *arma Christi*, so that we might use them now to transfigure us and our world. How?

Well every time we're pierced by criticism or crowned with some indignity—every time we have our image maligned, thirst for what's right, or taste the bitterness of life, we might share his work of transfiguration. And every time these pin-pricks happen, we're united to our sisters and brothers throughout the world, who suffer far more grievously. Then, we have the chance to use these weapons for their good and God's glory. Let's ask the angels who surround the cross, that we will shortly kiss, to minister to us as they did to him and to help us to win glory in the day of battle.
