To Be in That Number

In the beginning Jesus chose twelve close companions, a group who mirrored the ancient twelve tribes of Israel. Later, he chose six times as many: seventy-two others who were sent out in pairs. And they increased, until the Apocalypse began to look forward to one hundred and forty-four thousand being saved:- a number impossible to count; but a multiple of the basic unit of God's first choice - an echo of the original pattern. What of this basic pattern, the shape of the chosen company of all the saints? Is it just a coincidence that the hundred and forty fourth psalm prays "Blessed be the Lord my rock, who trains my hands for battle, my fingers for war! He is my fortress, my stronghold, my deliverer - my shield in whom I trust"? No! Not a coincidence. From the beginning, in the Christian consciousness, all the saints have been numbered like an army of salvation, marching in glory and a hundred and forty four thousand is the number we want to be in - the number that counts for God's choice of the blessed. Since the time of Solomon, the chosen have wondered: "Who is she that cometh forth as the morning rising, fair as the moon and bright as the sun - terrible as an army in battle array."

Why might the image of all the saints as an army be helpful to us - especially in these days when we eschew all things military and the thought of conflict is so unappealing? Well first let's think about the seal and the shield - images so important to early Christians. Those who are chosen are sealed with an indelible mark. A Christian's sense of belonging to God and to their brothers and sisters in Christ was such that they looked for a way of explaining this deep sense of solidarity - one of the best, suggested it was like the soldier who was branded - sealed in a company which he could never desert and outside of which was no meaning or life. Christians wanted to be in that sort of company with God and never to lose that life - gladly they would be sealed with the seal of the living God - in all circumstances they would take up the shield of faith.

Perhaps you have seen some of the formations that the Roman battalions took - the groups of soldiers with shields to right and left and above that could move towards the enemy - like tortoise or armadillo, unharmed. This was the number Christians wanted to be in - a formation where if one is injured or falls, the ranks can close, a group which gives protection from all sides and can go forward against all difficulty and obstruction. A formation which shared a common life.

This is the pattern of life and love that Jesus looks to in the Beatitudes: the vision of the blessed - what peacemakers and the pure of heart can achieve between themselves: what the gentle and those who suffer can make manifest amongst one another: - the formation Pope Francis saw in his image of the church as a field hospital amidst the battle of life.

In the Eucharistic Prayer of the Roman Canon we pray "admit us into their company we beseech you" - lock us in, seal us into this formation of all the saints - those who are shielded by faith, share life and are protected from harm. Even if military language no longer echoes with us — what it represents does the fact that all that matters is being true to the form of the Body of Christ — the form it had in the beginning has now in us and will have forever in all the saints.
