A First Intervention

When I visited Our Lady of Grace school this week, the infant children were returning from a trip to the Post Office - all excited. Not only had they experienced the busy branch, seen all the parcels, and learnt about stamps - they'd sent their letters to Santa! All I want for Christmas was the topic of conversation. Only one little girl asked me if I did Christmas and what I was getting!

Maybe you're thinking it's too early for such questions - Advent hadn't even started then. Perhaps you think it just a bit of nonsense? In fact, every day of last week - the final days of the Church's year - a very focused prayer is made at Mass asking God to make His people ready: Ready to receive the healing remedies that He wants to give us with Love. If you haven't thought of what you want for Christmas yet - God has. He decided long ago what his particular gift to each one of us would be and how to get it to us at just the right time. His gift is absolute healing for us all and He's started on its delivery now: Advent is the process that will make us ready to receive the complete healing that'll be ours at Christmas.

In this joyful, holy season let's, this year, think of healing, then, and do all we can to appreciate God's motives and His methods in sending us His Son. On each of the Sundays let's be part of God's purpose: from His first intervention today, to His diagnosis and assessment next week, to a glimpse of full recovery on the Third Sunday, and the work of rehabilitation that will bring us home for Christmas, on the Fourth.

The first stage of healing is often not pretty is it? - Usually, there's a first intervention that can be more traumatic than the illness itself: the re-setting of a broken bone, the cauterising of a wound, the needle of anaesthetic or the knife of the surgeon. It can all come suddenly and without warning: "We're going to have to open you up," are the words of the Divine Physician at this stage.

While we can't predict their application in our lives, our readings, today, should come as no surprise: Isaiah tells us that God is going to move mountains to make His healing touch of us possible. For this first intervention we need to be awake - at least from inattention. And as the Gospel makes clear: God's first act of healing will be sudden and decisive and we'll not be able to avoid it.

This is why it's important to know God's purpose from the beginning and have an eye to what's going on. At this time children are forever looking for signs of what might be coming their way at Christmas - looking to where their surprises might be stashed. We are God's children and on this First Sunday of Advent we should be looking to His hand for healing.
