Conquering the Fortress

A word from today's Gospel echoes with us from the first Sunday of Lent - from Christ's temptations in the wilderness. Just now, we heard that Jesus "drove out" all those who were buying and selling in the Temple. And the people ask his authority for doing this? Well, we were told of his authority, when we heard the Gospel say, previously, that the Spirit "drove" him into the wilderness. He can drive out because he was driven in: Because in the wilderness of his heart, he had the experience of being tempted, yet conquering, Satan. So now, the same Holy Spirit gives him the authority to drive out the evil that holds humanity captive in their hearts.

Before ever he was a priest, or founder of the Jesuits, St Ignatius of Loyola was a soldier. During a siege on the Spanish city of Pamplona, his leg was shattered by a canon ball and he had to be treated and to convalesce. In that painful period of his life, he learned to fight in a different way. He took to the battlefield of his own mind and heart; came to know Jesus as his Captain in the fight and how Jesus conquers the fortress of our heart. It was on his sickbed that Ignatius learned the ways of his Spiritual Exercises and set out the rules of combat, that he learnt from our Saviour.

One or two of his rules are very helpful for our understanding both of today's Gospel and our battle to gain possession of our heart this Lent. In his first rule, St Ignatius says that the enemy most commonly uses apparent pleasures and superficial delights, to hold us captive and prevent us from growing in knowledge and love. The Devil traps us on the surface of life with money, pleasure and shallow things and stops our heart from engaging with God, who is actually at the heart of all that makes life good. In his own battle, Ignatius discovered that the good spirit of Jesus fights for us by driving us on to discover God in all things and at the heart of life.

And this is what we see in the Gospel isn't it? Jesus overturning all that is superficial, 'the rag and bone shop of our hearts' and taking possession of the centre. It's why we try to fast and pray at this time - in order to let go of what holds us and be free to engage with what really attracts us deep down.

There's another rule of St Ignatius that is helpful too. That as soon as we try to go from good to better, the evil spirit will bring obstacles and discouragement. Then we must have patience and remember that the Lord is at our side and will bring consolations on our way. To these graces we must cling for encouragement and little by little, the Lord will gain ground.

Finally, the mysterious last lines of our Gospel hint at our ultimate reward. Jesus doesn't entrust himself to those who are enthralled by his miracles and trapped by superficial things. He knows what's in our heart and when we have the discipline to discover what's there too: he will give himself to us in great measure. The psalm says: he is my love, my fortress my saviour.
