Synchronise your Watches

Maybe you remember the old war films? Often, there would be a scene of soldiers preparing for a mission. Located in strategic places, these men would be in contact with their Captain who, just before the command, would say: "Synchronise your watches". It was crucial to the success of the mission that events happened simultaneously.

Today's readings speak very clearly of something similar. The risen Jesus, our Captain, stands amongst his disciples and in that moment they enter the same hour of his Passion, the new day of Resurrection. The Gospel tells us pointedly; that it was the evening of the same day, the first day of the week, when Jesus appeared. He stands among them on the day of Resurrection and invites them into the hour of his victory:—Just then, he shows them his hands and his feet and communicates his peace. "As the Father has sent me, so I am sending you—those whose sins you forgive, they are forgiven." In other words, he is asking them to synchronise with Him—to enter that glorious hour in which his wounded body took on a glorious new life.

Jesus asks us to synchronise ourselves with the time of the Resurrection today, so that we might engage in the mission of spreading his new life in the world. On this Sunday—that is both the Octave of Easter and Divine Mercy Sunday, the Church asks us to consider two things.

First—the Octave—the eighth day. What is this? Well, on the seventh day of creation God took His rest—a sabbath from all the work he had been doing. The early Christians then spoke of Jesus rising from that sabbath rest to complete a new creation through his Resurrection: This, they referred to as the Eighth Day—not a chronological continuation but a marvellous and mysterious remastering of time and place through his rising from the dead. This is the day that the Lord has made—a day of light, refreshment and peace. You might have noticed that our font is octagonal:—Its eight sides represent the life of the new day, to which our Captain synchronises us in Baptism and gives us the mission of spreading the new life of this hour.

Central to the Divine Mercy devotion, is the Three O'clock Prayer. For the Gospel of John the hour of Christ's death is also the hour of his new life for the Church. As he expired on the Cross, he breathed out the Spirit of new life as the water of Baptism and Blood of the Eucharist, simultaneously flowed from his side. This was the hour—the hour that began the new day: The hour of divine mercy in which we gained forgiveness and new life.

On this octave day of Divine Mercy, each of us, through Baptism and the Eucharist, is invited by the Risen Lord to step into a new dimension; to atune our lives to the forgiveness and peace that he won for us in that hour. Synchronise your watches—the mission is beginning!
